TPS Supports the #TeamToronto Vaccination Roll-Out

On April 23, 2021, Mayor John Tory announced that the one millionth COVID-19 vaccination had been administered in the city. The #TeamToronto effort has involved the collaboration of Toronto Public Health, many of the City's health partners, and first responders including our own paramedics.

Since the start of the pandemic, Community Paramedics have been supporting vulnerable residents with pop-up COVID testing, vaccinations for homebound individuals,

and support for Mass Immunization Clinics (MICs).

In April, teams of Toronto Paramedics and Firefighters partnered with physicians and other healthcare professionals to further support vaccinations of vulnerable residents through mobile clinics. These response teams ensure that individuals experiencing homelessness or living in high-priority congregate settings, such as shelters, drop-in sites and encampments, have access to COVID-19 vaccines.



In January, following the triennial review, the TPS Communications Centre was reaccredited by the International Academies of Emergency Dispatch (IAED) as an Accredited Centre of Excellence (ACE) for the fifth time! ACE accreditation is the highest level of international achievement that a communications centre can obtain and is based on consistently high levels of performance and adherence to MPDS protocols.

In addition to the entire Communications Centre receiving ACE accreditation, 32 call takers and emergency medical dispatchers received individual ACE awards for their performance.

A Year of Firsts: 12 Months with COVID-19

During the month of March, the City of Toronto marked a number of milestones reflecting on the past, remembering those whose lives have been lost to COVID-19, and recognizing the continued efforts of fronvtline and essential workers.

March 11, 2021, was declared a National Day of Observance for the anniversary of the World Health Organization's (WHO's) declaration of a global pandemic and the first COVID-19-related death in Ontario.
